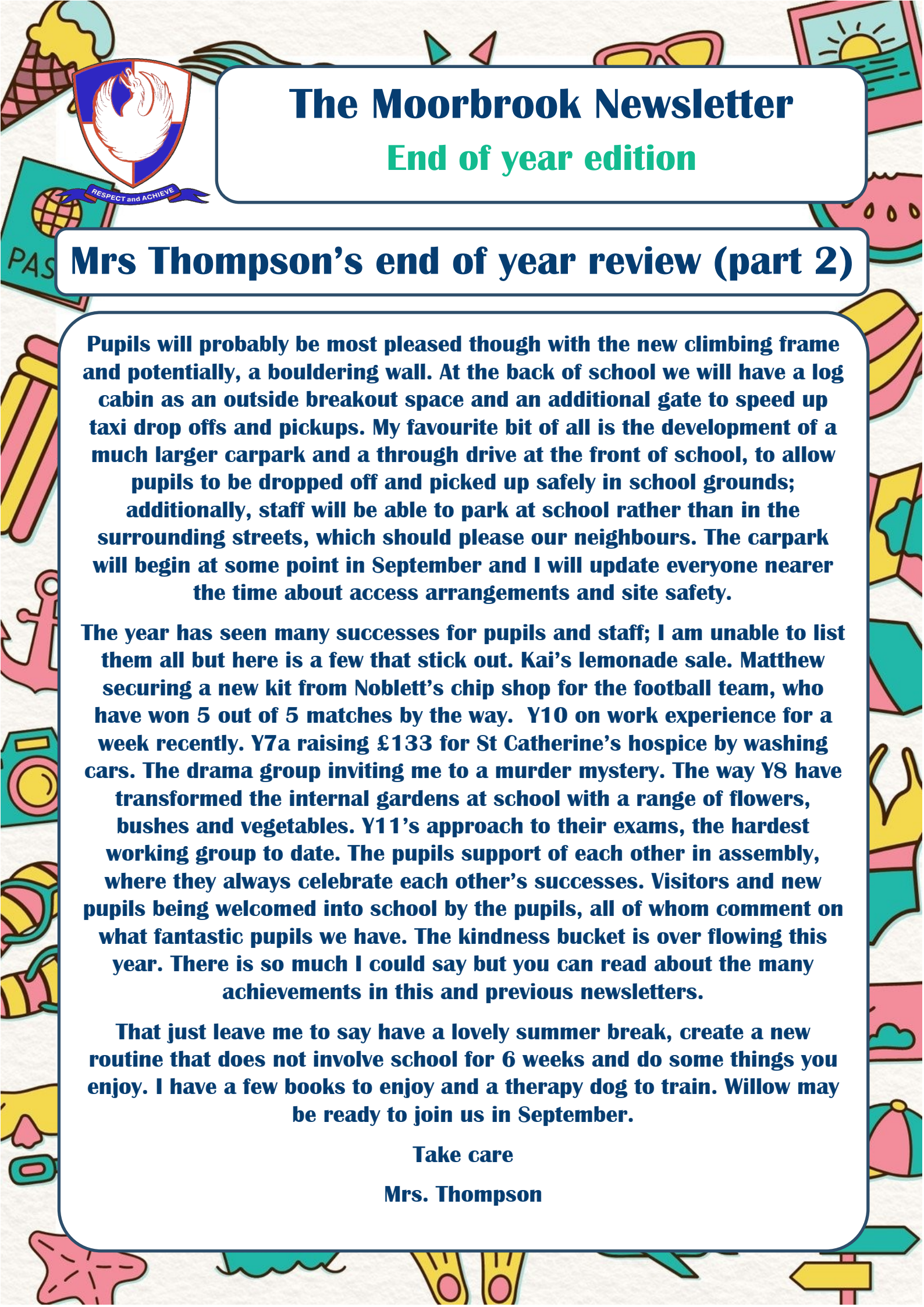
Mrs Thompson's end of year review (part 1)

Well, that is another school year over! This year Moorbrook has thrived; it has been one of the best years yet! We started the year with new staff; 2 year 7 classes, a new team for the MIP provisions and some improved areas to the school building. We end the year with a strong team of staff, all pupils settled and making progress, both in main school and on MIP, plus further exciting building work ahead.

We know we are a good school: our parental, pupil and staff surveys tell us so, but it was lovely to have Ofsted visit and confirm they think so too. Moorbrook has become a sought after school and we will be expanding further in Sept 25 to accommodate more pupils in main school and on MIP. It is thanks to our strong staff team that we are able to undertake this further expansion.

The biggest asset in any school is the staff and their ability to meet pupil needs, I am hugely proud of our team and how hard they work to adapt teaching and learning to ensure each pupil can achieve their best. In addition, how they support each other's development as staff. The team is very strong with a wide range of expertise and experience. A recent internal interview for a TA3 post almost brought me to tears. The young TA joined Moorbrook with little to no experience of education support, they have blossomed under the guidance of the team and the available training; their answers were some of the best ever given in any TA interview and had the school ethos underpinning them all. I feel sure our new staff will quickly settle in with the support of our fantastic team.

Beginning over summer, we are having a number of new spaces created in the building through some internal remodeling. I would like to thank LCC for their support and confidence to invest in our school. On our return in September, we should have a new Y7 space with bigger classrooms; dedicated breakout spaces and a bigger outdoor area. In the current Y7 space, we will have a KS3 nurture class; with their own break out space and outdoor area. There will also be a larger intervention room. We will have a new library, which is much cosier and simply for the enjoyment of reading. The old library is becoming a dedicated Thrive classroom providing additional support for social and emotional needs. We are creating a life skills classroom to expand the range of learning experiences for KS4 options; we may even teach pupils how to do their own ironing. We are also benefitting from a dedicated music room, which will have much better acoustics and mean the band do not have to keep moving their instruments each day. We will have a purpose built sensory room and extra equipment for movement breaks to support pupil's self-regulation.

Pupils will probably be most pleased though with the new climbing frame and potentially, a bouldering wall. At the back of school we will have a log cabin as an outside breakout space and an additional gate to speed up taxi drop offs and pickups. My favourite bit of all is the development of a much larger carpark and a through drive at the front of school, to allow pupils to be dropped off and picked up safely in school grounds; additionally, staff will be able to park at school rather than in the surrounding streets, which should please our neighbours. The carpark will begin at some point in September and I will update everyone nearer the time about access arrangements and site safety.

The year has seen many successes for pupils and staff; I am unable to list them all but here is a few that stick out. Kai's lemonade sale. Matthew securing a new kit from Noblett's chip shop for the football team, who have won 5 out of 5 matches by the way. Y10 on work experience for a week recently. Y7a raising £133 for St Catherine's hospice by washing cars. The drama group inviting me to a murder mystery. The way Y8 have transformed the internal gardens at school with a range of flowers, bushes and vegetables. Y11's approach to their exams, the hardest working group to date. The pupils support of each other in assembly, where they always celebrate each other's successes. Visitors and new pupils being welcomed into school by the pupils, all of whom comment on what fantastic pupils we have. The kindness bucket is over flowing this year. There is so much I could say but you can read about the many achievements in this and previous newsletters.

That just leave me to say have a lovely summer break, create a new routine that does not involve school for 6 weeks and do some things you enjoy. I have a few books to enjoy and a therapy dog to train. Willow may be ready to join us in September.

What a brilliant year we have had in English! Years 8, 9 and 10 have made this an amazing first year in this role for me. They have all worked so hard and watching them all grow in confidence and develop a genuine love for reading new texts has been brilliant.

This term, Year 8 have been learning about sinister stories, looking at character development, descriptive language, punctuation and story settings. We have shared a range of short stories which culminated in them all planning and writing a scary story of their own.



Year 9 have been looking at non – fiction language and writing techniques all surrounding a ‘whodunit’ crime scene investigation. They have studied a range of evidence in different forms looking at the types of language, structure and tone needed for each different type of writing style. It has been fun gathering the evidence and making our predictions on who killed Victor Frankenstein.

Year 10 have been focusing on key English skills needed as they enter their GCSE year. They have all worked super hard and I have high aspirations for them all in Year 11. Alongside this they chose a class novel, ‘Over the line’ by Tom Palmer, about a professional footballer who has to sign up to be a soldier during World War 1, they have all read out loud with confidence and have shown great enthusiasm for the story.

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Subject recap - Science

This term, Year 7A have been working incredibly hard learning all about animals and humans. We've explored the major organ systems, how our bodies function, and what keeps us alive and healthy! The students really engaged with learning about the skeleton, muscles, and how nutrients travel around the body.



Year 7B have been learning about living things and their habitats. From food chains to adaptations, they've shown great interest and curiosity. One of the highlights was the yeast bottle experiment, where students observed how yeast produces gas—a fun way to see respiration in action!

Year 8 have been investigating materials and their properties. We've been hands-on in the lab, extracting salt from rock salt using filtration and evaporation, testing different insulation materials, and carrying out various experiments that explored changes in states of matter and material usefulness in real life contexts.



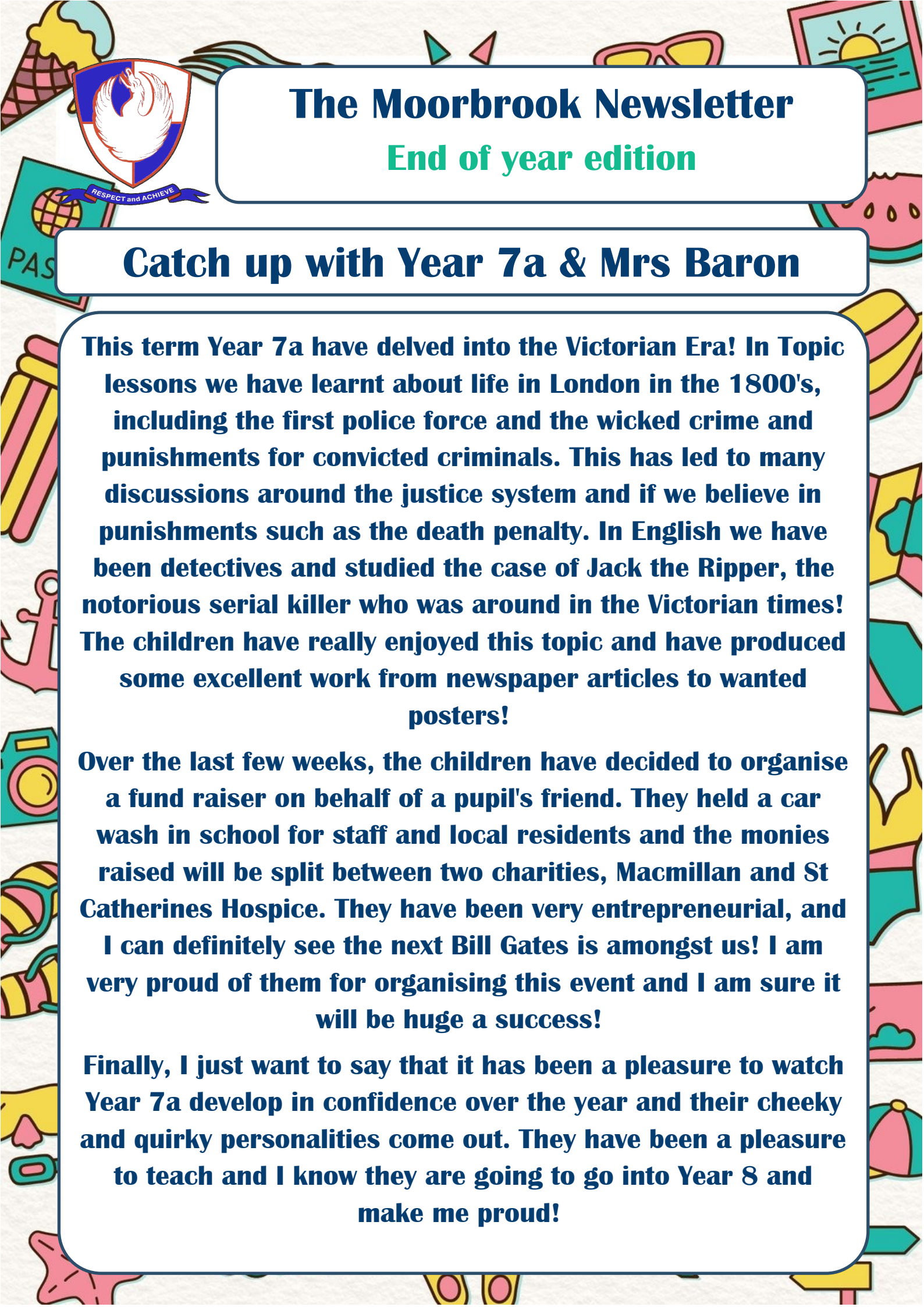
Year 9s have continued their journey through GCSE Biology, currently working through Topic 2: Organisation, which links back to the health and disease content we covered earlier in the year. In Physics, we've also been learning about electricity—building circuits and exploring how electrical energy powers devices we use every day.

Year 10 students have been diving deeper into GCSE Biology with a focus on Organisation, exploring how organs and systems work together to keep us healthy. In addition, they've been learning about light and sun safety, even designing their own sunglasses based on how light behaves. Lots of creativity and scientific thinking on display!

A huge well done to our Year 11 students! I'm incredibly proud of the commitment, resilience, and maturity you've shown this year. You've worked so hard preparing for your GCSEs, and I have every confidence you'll go on to achieve amazing things. Best of luck in everything you do — and don't forget to stay curious!

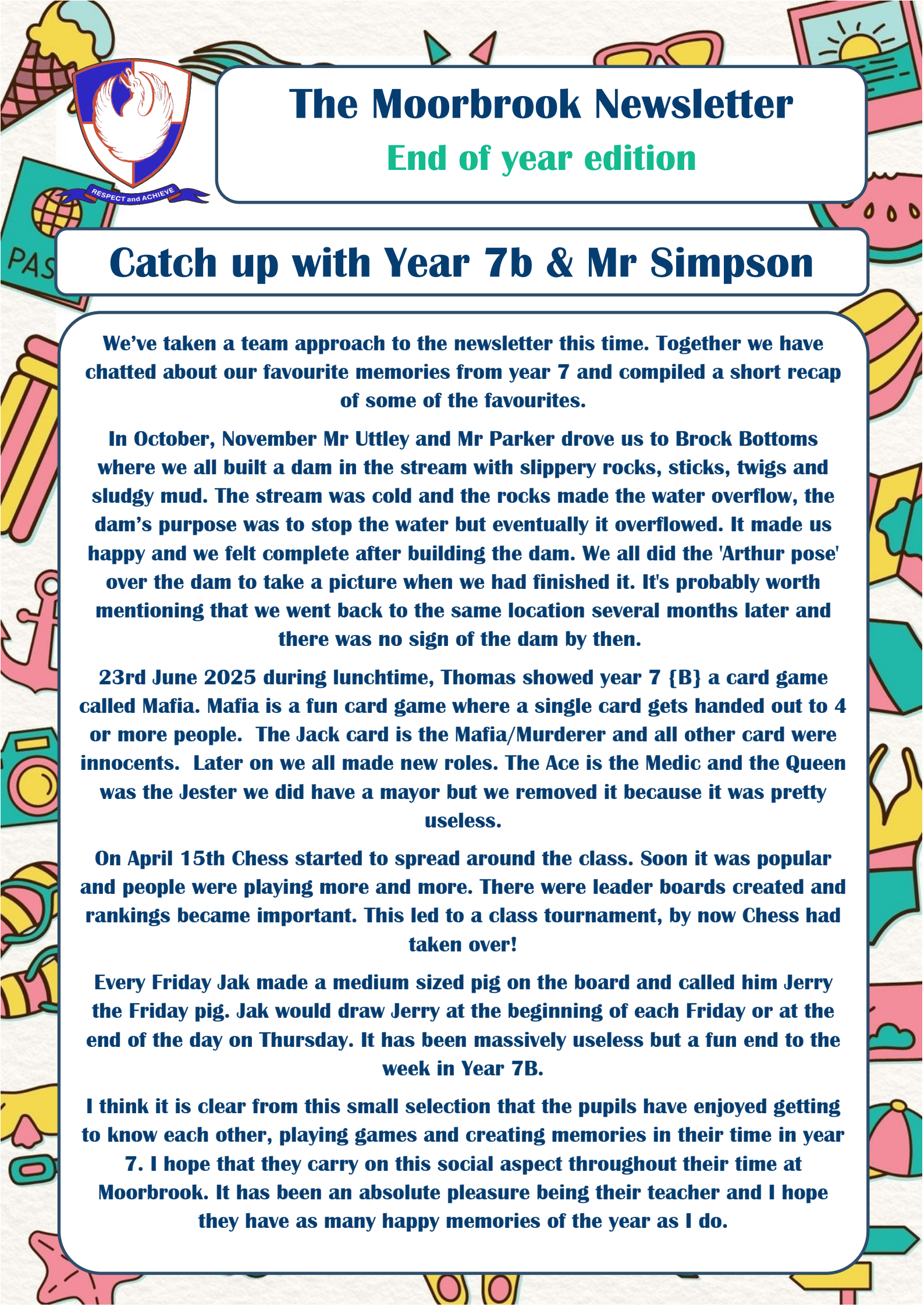
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The football team & our day at Gigg Lane!

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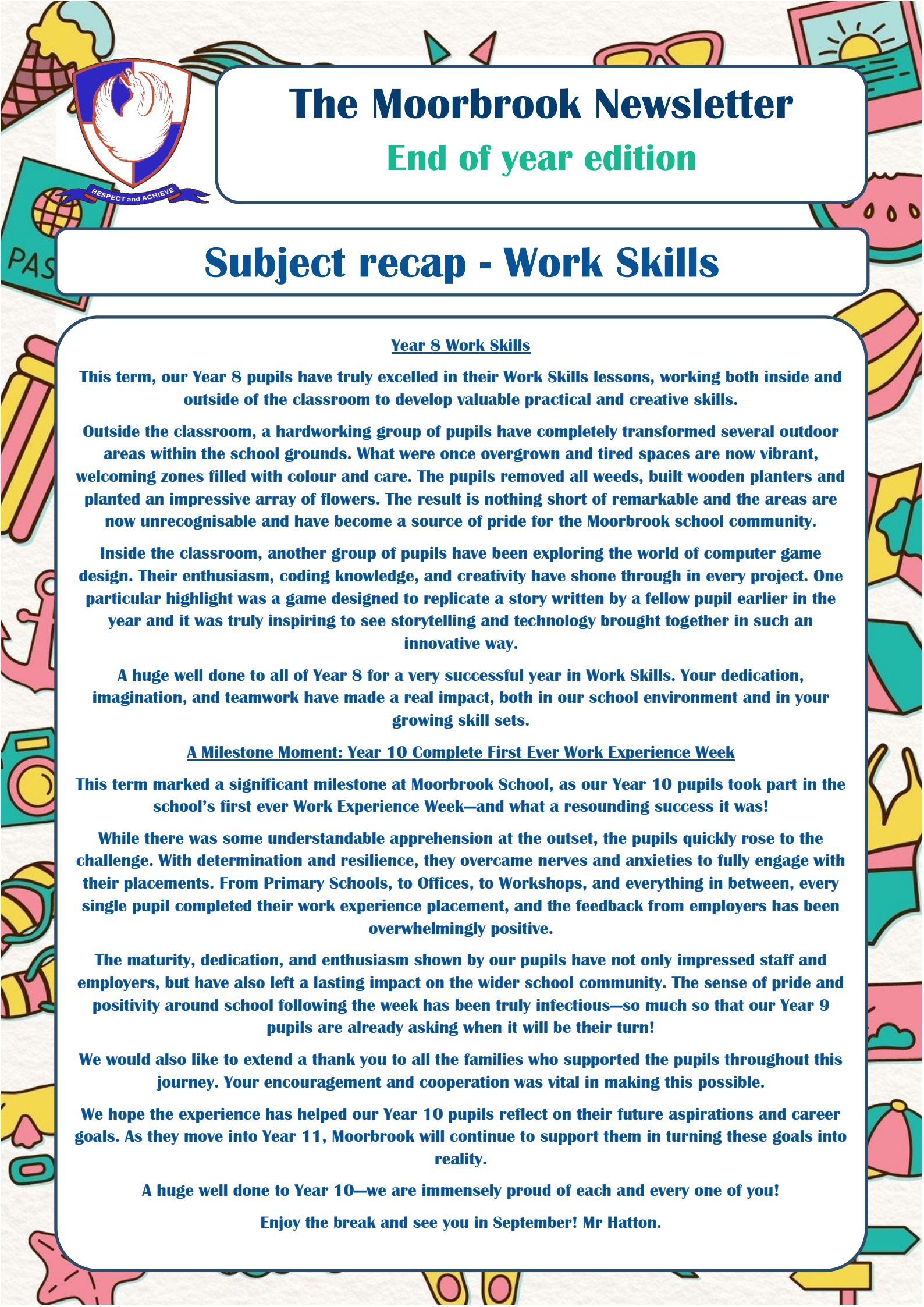
Subject recap - Outdoor Education

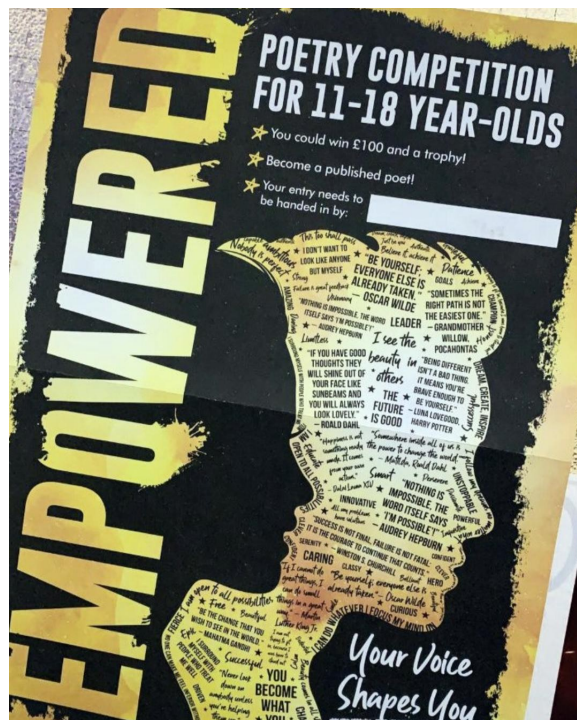
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Published Student Writers - Empowered

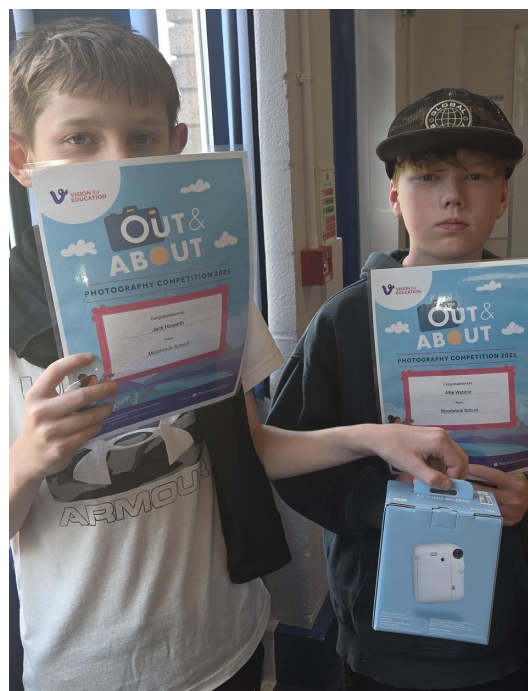

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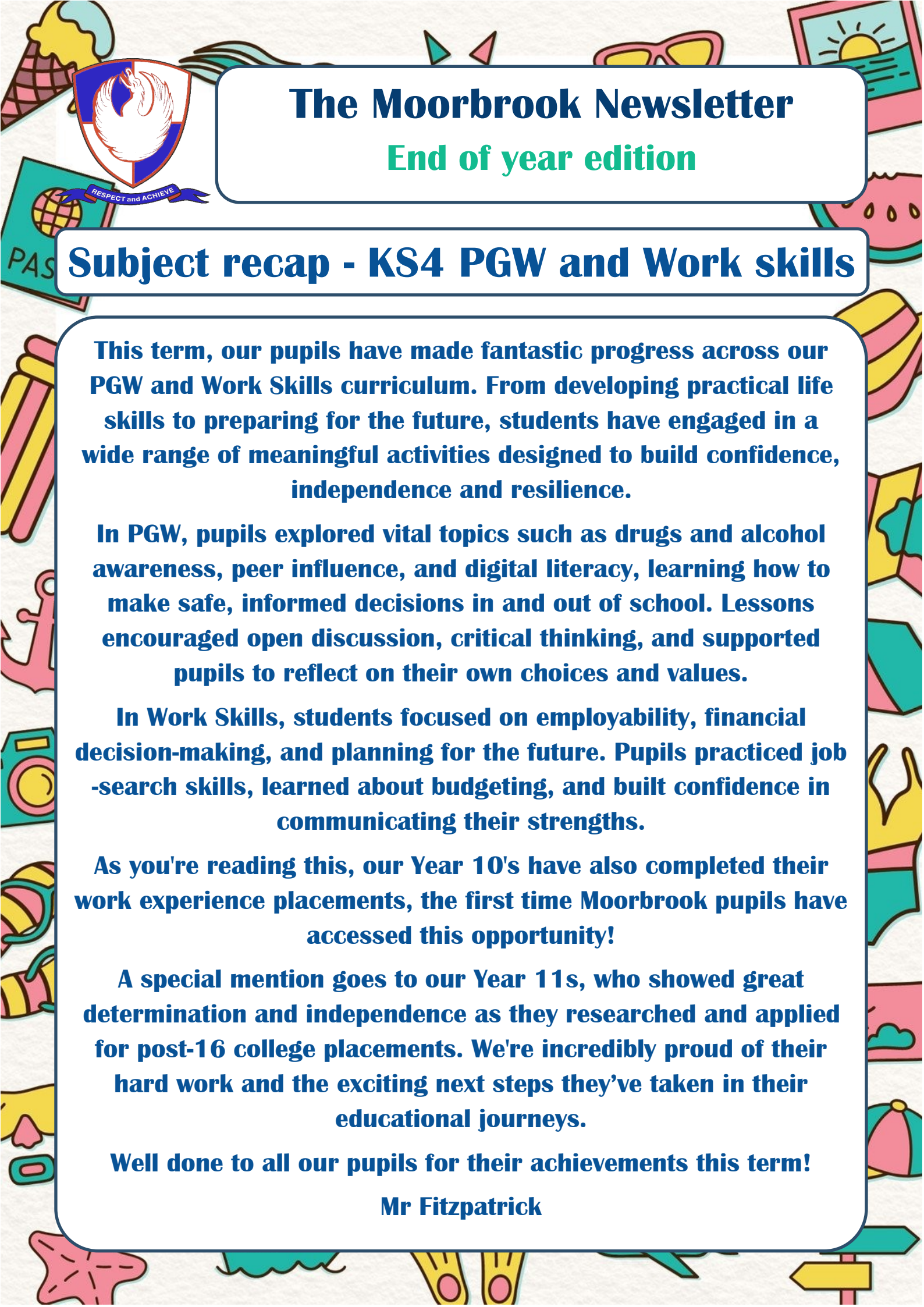
Year 11 Goodbye

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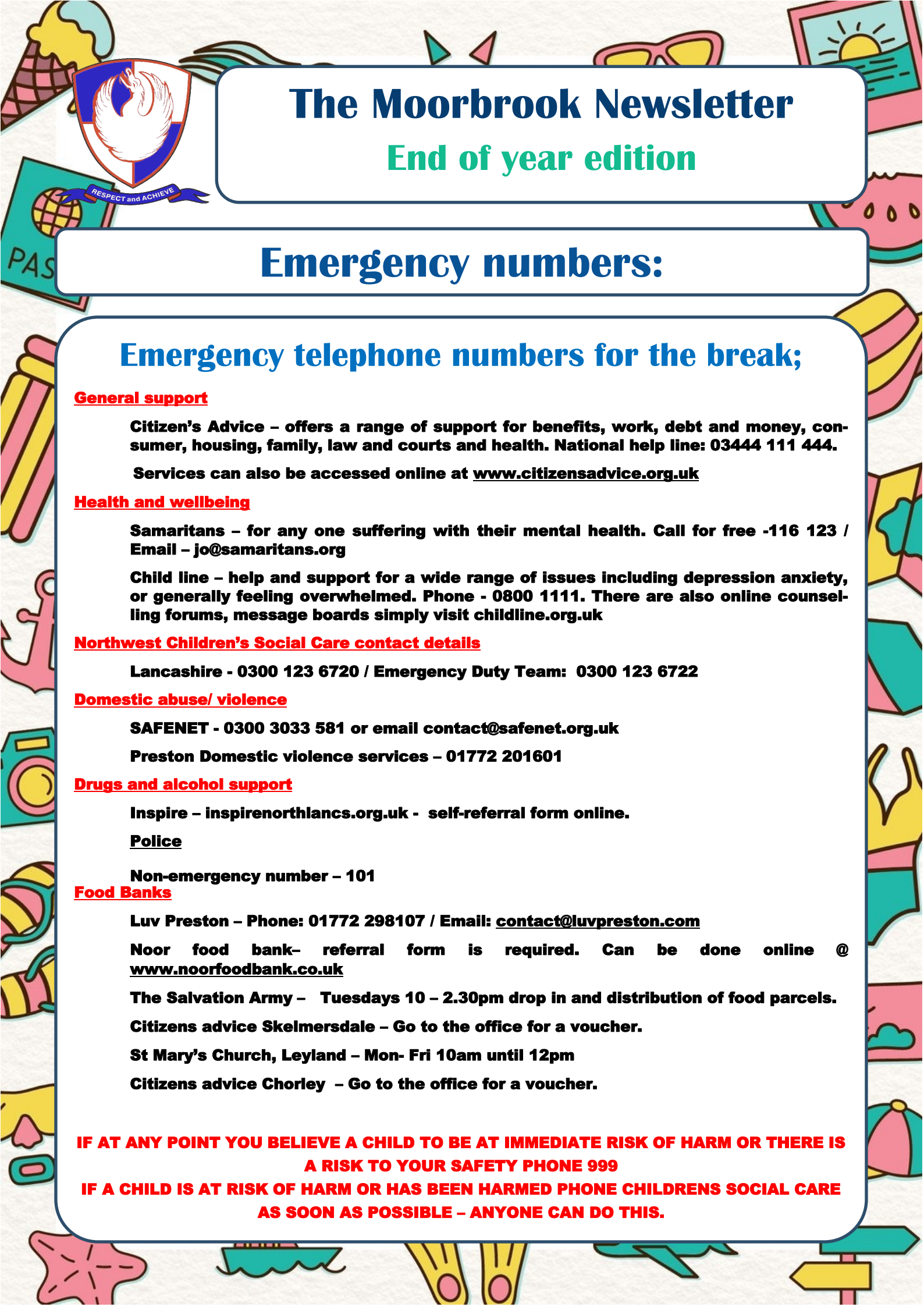
